Are You Ready to Write a Grant?

- · Grant funding is work
- Grant funding should not be determined by financial needs
 - -STRINGS ARE ATTACHED
- Do you have a well thought out project?
- What are you trying to achieve?

Are You Ready to Write a Grant?

- Can you accomplish the goals and objectives of the project alone or are you relying on other partners?
- How much time do you have to work on the project?
- What are the outcomes of the project?

Are You Ready to Write a Grant?

- How will you demonstrate you have made an impact or achieved the project outcomes?
- Is this a project that can be replicated?
- Is this a project that can be sustained?

Are You Ready to Write a Grant?

- Does the project reach an underserved population?
- Are timelines achievable?
- What are the reporting requirements?

 - -Local business or civic organizations
- Private grants (State and National)
 - Alabama Power Foundation, Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation, Community Foundations, RWJ, Kresge

- · State grants
 - –ADECA, ADPH chronic disease management grants
- · Federal grants
 - -HRSA, CDC

Federal Grants

- · Grants.gov website
- Most federal grants -- compliance and reporting issues
- Must have DUNS number
- Would not recommend CDC or HRSA grants at local level – work with central office

Local or Foundation Grants: Tips

- Read the Funding Announcement (FOA) or Request for Proposal (RFP)
 - -Read multiple times
- Does your CHD have the capacity to accomplish what is being described in the FOA?

Local or Foundation Grants: Tips

- Is it worth the effort? Are you ready to take on the tasks associated with the grant guidance?
- Can you meet the reporting requirements of the grant?

Local or Foundation Grants: Tips

- How will you measure the outcomes of the activities and demonstrate impact?
- How does the grant relate to your (Public Health's) overall mission and goals?
- Who will be responsible for managing the budgets? How will the accounting be set up for the grant budget? (do not co-mingle)

Local or Foundation Grants: Tips

- · Participate in any technical assistance calls
- Make sure you answer the questions posed in the grant guidance
- · Succinct, simple responses are best
 - Be clear, concise, and to the point
- Assume the reader/reviewer knows nothing about your organization or project

Local or Foundation Grants: Tips

- Make sure the application flows well
 - It should be organized and logical
- Have someone outside the organization read it
 - If we work in a place day in and day out, we may assume things that outsiders do not know
- Do not use acronyms without defining them

IMPORTANT TERMS

- <u>Evidence-based</u> is a common term today
 - This means that a project has been tried in numerous locations, a review study has been published, and overall results were positive

IMPORTANT TERMS

- <u>Sustainable</u> How will the project continue after the grant funding is over
- Example: If you prove return on investment and savings, (patients don't use ER) program can be sustained through support from local hospital

Example – Alabama Power Foundation Grant

- Determining if you are a competitive candidate to apply:
- Does the project address a need in one of the following areas:
 - Education
 - Community Life
 - Health and Human Services
 - Arts and Culture
 - The Environment

Alabama Power Foundation Grant Example

- Could the project lead to permanent, enduring improvements in a community or a state?
- Will a diverse group collaborate on the project to achieve common goals?
- Can the program be duplicated in other communities?

Alabama Power Foundation Grant Example

- Does the project address an underserved segment(s) of the population?
- Could the organization attract multiple sources of support for the project?
- Does the submitting organization demonstrate sound fiscal management and accountability?

Common Parts of a Grant

- Need Statement
- · Goals and Objectives
- Work Plan and Timelines
- Evaluation impact, outcomes
- Budget and Budget Narratives
- Sustainability
