




Percent of Home Ownership by Age

Persons under the age of 45 and those who have less than a bachelor's degree are more likely to be renting than owning a home.


The state average of renter occupied units is 30.8 percent.

The state average of home ownership is 69.2 percent.






Percent Uninsured by **Race and Income**



The state average is 9.5 percent.




Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) Data Disclaimer:

Nearly two thirds of states use BRFSS data to support health-related legislative efforts.
- The annual cross-sectional survey is collected through landline and cellphone delivered questions.


Adult smoking status in the past 12 months

Adult BMI category in the past 12 months




Adults who participated in physical activity in the past 12 months

Adults who were told they have high blood pressure




