ABCs of Diabetes



for the A1C test. The A1C test shows you what your blood sugar



(glucose) has been over the last three months. High blood sugar levels can harm your heart and blood vessels, kidneys, feet, and eyes.



for blood pressure. High blood pressure makes your heart work too hard. It can cause heart attack, stroke, and kidney disease.



for cholesterol. One kind of cholesterol, called LDL, can build up and clog your blood vessels. It can cause heart attack or stroke.

for stop smoking. Ask for help or call 1-800-QUIT-NOW

Ask your health care team:

What your A1C, blood pressure, and cholesterol numbers are; What your ABC numbers should be; and What you can do to reach your ABC goals.
