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INTRODUCTION

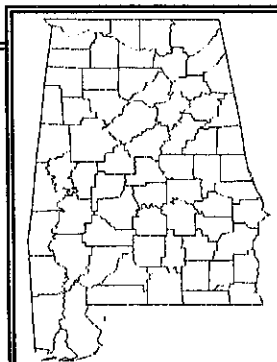
This County Profiles publication is Volume IV of four volumes of Alabama Vital Events. It is an annual publication which contains all information previously presented in the "Area Profiles" section of the Alabama Vital Events publication, plus additional health-related data on Alabama and each of the 67 counties.

For years 1972 through 1993, the Alabama Vital Events publication consisted of approximately 275 pages of tables, graphs, and charts. The "Area Profiles" section was introduced in 1986. In 1994, this publication was divided into four volumes: Volume I, Pregnancy Statistics (the former "Nativity" plus fetal deaths); Volume II, Mortality Statistics (the former "Mortality" section excluding fetal deaths); Volume III, Marriage and Divorce Statistics (the former "Marriage" and Divorce" sections); and Volume IV, County Profiles (the former "Area Profiles" section).

To better meet the data needs of its users, information in this publication has been expanded for each county from one to three pages. Access to specific vital events data at the county level has become a necessity to a broad group of data users including health professionals and planners. In addition, a large number of other variables are closely related and must be considered in analyzing the overall health status of a county. Vital events data presented in this publication now include additional information relating to pregnancy, cancer mortality by site, and accidental deaths by type of accident. Other health-related subjects on which data have been added include health care facilities, health care practitioners, mental health, mental illness, maternal delivery, notifiable diseases, environmental systems, labor force participation, assistance program participation, crime, population, poverty status, and income.

The contents of these profiles may not meet all data needs. Accordingly, the sources of specific information have been included and should be consulted if additional data are required.

NOTE: These population projections are based on the population growth and migration trends of the decade of the 1980s. The 1990s have shown much stronger growth than the trends for the 1980s had projected. The Center for Business and Economic Research will issue revised projections as soon as detailed estimates become available from the Bureau of the Census. See NOTES for data sources and notations.

NOTES

Caution should be exercised in using measurements based on small denominators. Rates and ratios based on a denominator of less than 50 births or less than 1,000 population are noted by an asterisk. For age-specific birth rates only, rates based on a denominator of less than 50 population are noted by an asterisk. All information presented in this profile is for the calendar year 1995 except as noted. Data sources other than the Alabama Department of Public Health (ADPH), Center for Health Statistics (CHS) are noted below.

HEALTH CARE FACILITIES AND PRACTITIONERS: 1995 nurse data, by county of residence, are provided by the Alabama Board of Nursing. Physician data is provided by the Alabama Board of Medical Examiners. PA-SA data are for 1996; physician data pertain to 1995 active licenses by county of work. Dental data for 1995, by county of residence, are provided by the Board of Dental Examiners of Alabama. Health care facilities data for 1995 are from the ADPH, Division of Licensure and Certification. Nursing home occupancy rates for 1995 are provided by the Alabama State Health Planning and Development Agency.

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

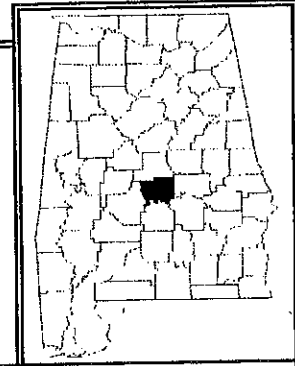
LABOR FORCE PARTICIPATION: Information (1995 annual average) excludes members of the U.S. military and is provided by the Alabama Department of Industrial Relations, Research and Statistics Division. Employment by industry is by county of work and includes only those industries subject to the provisions of Alabama's Unemployment Compensation Law. Civilian labor force estimates are by county of residence.

ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PARTICIPATION: Medicaid eligible information for FY 1995 is provided by the Alabama Medicaid Agency. Counties will not total to the state due to residents moving across county lines during the fiscal year. Medicaid recipient data for FY 1995 for the state is provided by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA). Medicaid recipient data for the counties is not available. Medicare information as of July 1, 1995, is provided by HCFA. Aid For Dependent Children information for October, 1994 to September, 1995 is provided by the Alabama Department of Human Resources. Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 *Crime in Alabama* published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

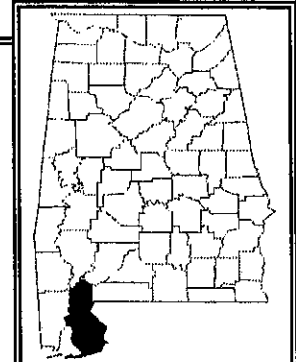

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

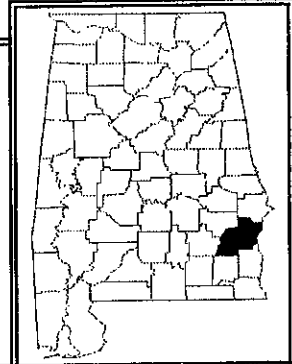

Medicaid recipient data for FY 1995 for the state is provided by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA). Medicaid recipient data for the counties is not available. Medicare information as of July 1, 1995, is provided by HCFA. Aid For Dependent Children information for October, 1994 to September, 1995 is provided by the Alabama Department of Human Resources. Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 *Crime in Alabama* published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

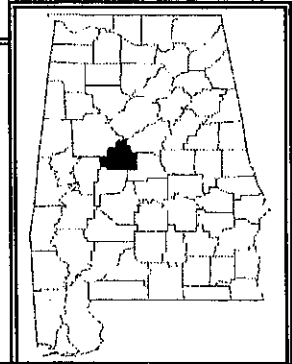

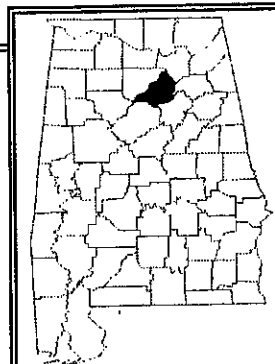

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

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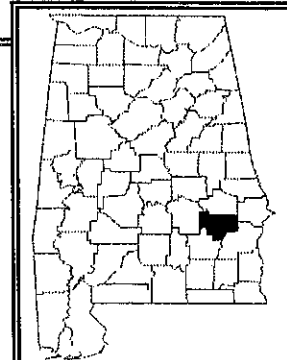

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

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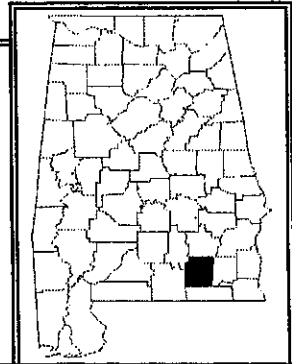

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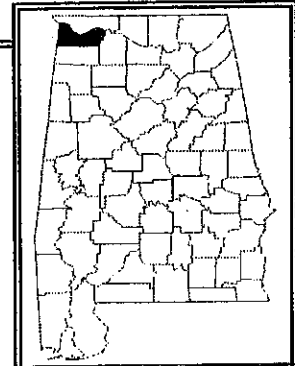

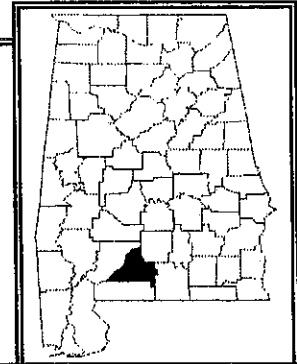

Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

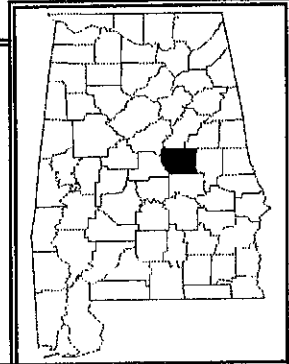

CRIME: Information is from 1995 Crime in Alabama published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

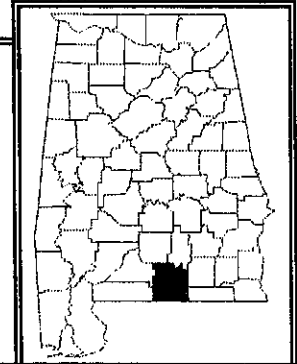

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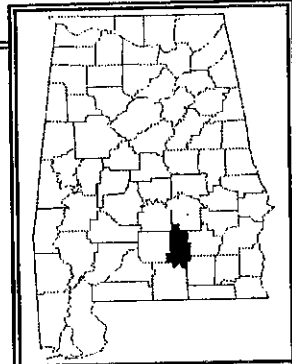

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

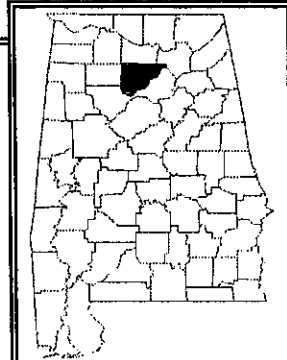

Health care facilities data for 1995 are from the ADPH, Division of Licensure and Certification. Nursing home occupancy rates for 1995 are provided by the Alabama State Health Planning and Development Agency.

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

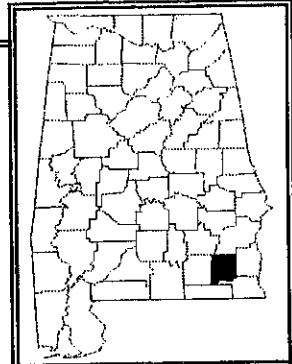

ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PARTICIPATION: Medicaid eligible information for FY 1995 is provided by the Alabama Medicaid Agency. Counties will not total to the state due to residents moving across county lines during the fiscal year. Medicaid recipient data for FY 1995 for the state is provided by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA). Medicaid recipient data for the counties is not available. Medicare information as of July 1, 1995, is provided by HCFA. Aid For Dependent Children information for October, 1994 to September, 1995 is provided by the Alabama Department of Human Resources. Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 *Crime in Alabama* published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

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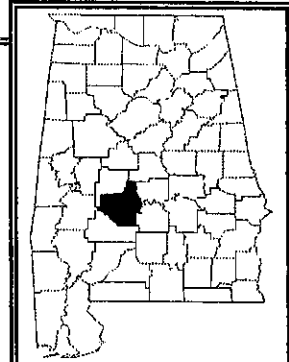

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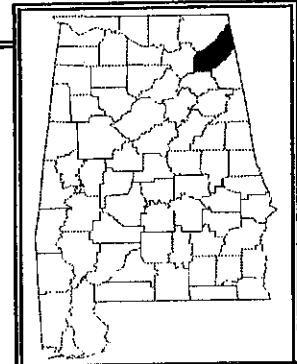

Health care facilities data for 1995 are from the ADPH, Division of Licensure and Certification. Nursing home occupancy rates for 1995 are provided by the Alabama State Health Planning and Development Agency.

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

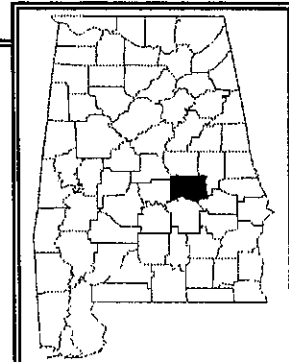

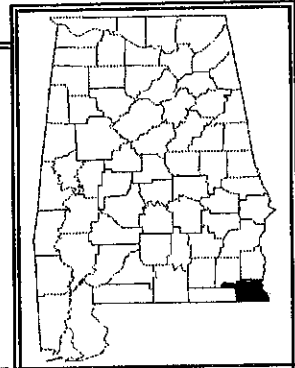

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

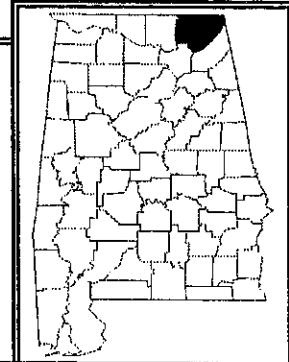

Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 Crime in Alabama published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

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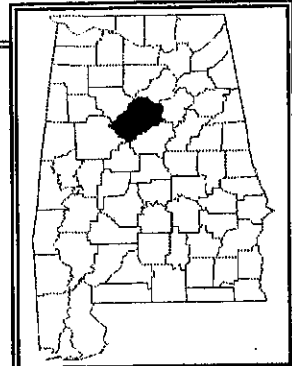

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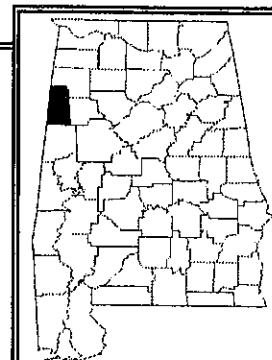

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

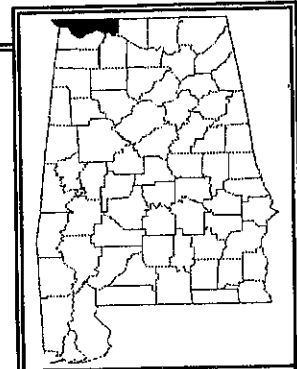

Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 *Crime in Alabama* published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Health care facilities data for 1995 are from the ADPH, Division of Licensure and Certification. Nursing home occupancy rates for 1995 are provided by the Alabama State Health Planning and Development Agency.

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

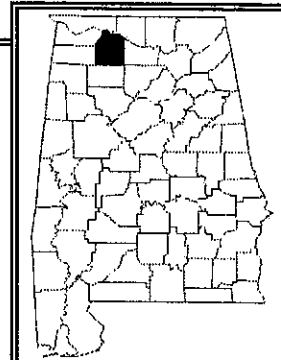

Employment by industry is by county of work and includes only those industries subject to the provisions of Alabama's Unemployment Compensation Law. Civilian labor force estimates are by county of residence.

ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PARTICIPATION: Medicaid eligible information for FY 1995 is provided by the Alabama Medicaid Agency. Counties will not total to the state due to residents moving across county lines during the fiscal year. Medicaid recipient data for FY 1995 for the state is provided by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA). Medicaid recipient data for the counties is not available. Medicare information as of July 1, 1995, is provided by HCFA. Aid For Dependent Children information for October, 1994 to September, 1995 is provided by the Alabama Department of Human Resources. Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 Crime in Alabama published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

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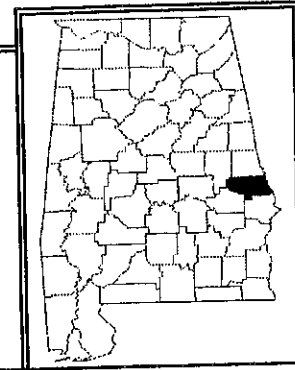

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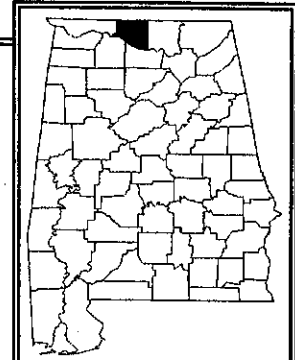

Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. 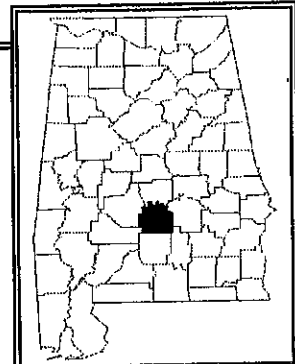

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

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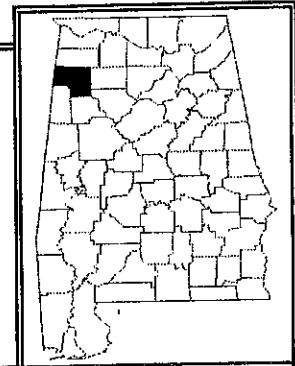

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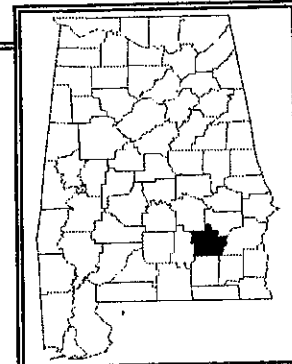

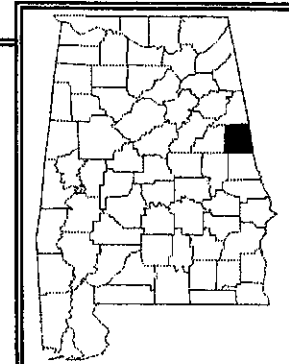

Health care facilities data for 1995 are from the ADPH, Division of Licensure and Certification. Nursing home occupancy rates for 1995 are provided by the Alabama State Health Planning and Development Agency.

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

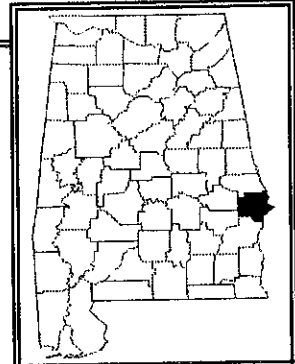

ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PARTICIPATION: Medicaid eligible information for FY 1995 is provided by the Alabama Medicaid Agency. Counties will not total to the state due to residents moving across county lines during the fiscal year. Medicaid recipient data for the state is provided by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA). Medicaid recipient data for the counties is not available. Medicare information as of July 1, 1995, is provided by HCFA. Aid For Dependent Children information for October, 1994 to September, 1995 is provided by the Alabama Department of Human Resources. Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 *Crime in Alabama* published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

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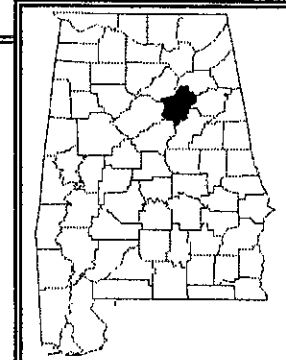

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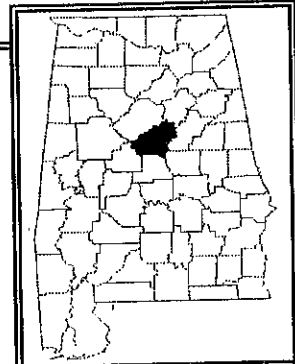

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

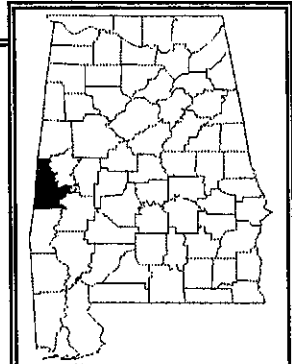

Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 Crime in Alabama published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

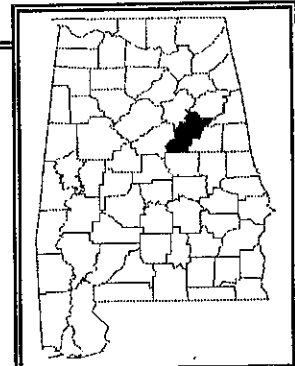

Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 Crime in Alabama published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

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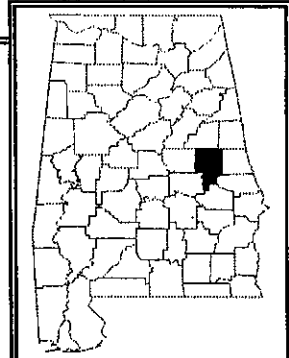

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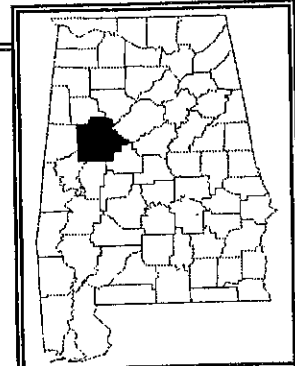

Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

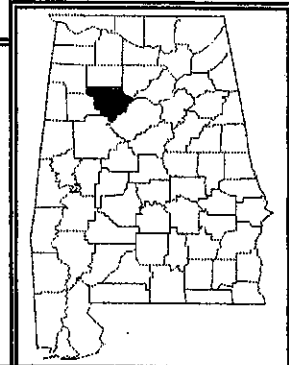

CRIME: Information is from 1995 Crime in Alabama published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

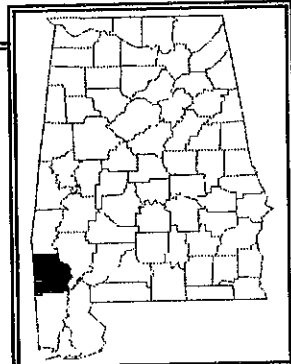

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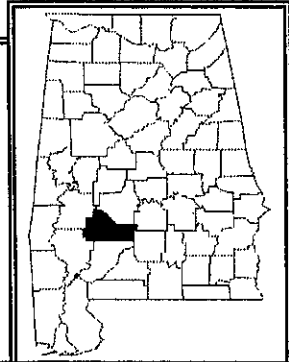

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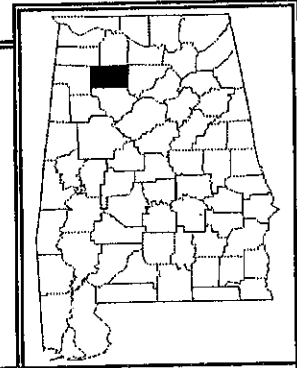

Data sources other than the Alabama Department of Public Health (ADPH), Center for Health Statistics (CHS) are noted below.

HEALTH CARE FACILITIES AND PRACTITIONERS: 1995 nurse data, by county of residence, are provided by the Alabama Board of Nursing. Physician data is provided by the Alabama Board of Medical Examiners. PA-SA data are for 1996; physician data pertain to 1995 active licenses by county of work. Dental data for 1995, by county of residence, are provided by the Board of Dental Examiners of Alabama. Health care facilities data for 1995 are from the ADPH, Division of Licensure and Certification. Nursing home occupancy rates for 1995 are provided by the Alabama State Health Planning and Development Agency.

MENTAL HEALTH/ILLNESS: Information for FY 1994-95 was obtained from the Alabama Department of Mental Health, Data Management Bureau, Statistical Analysis Section. Community Mental Health Center totals include only residents of service area counties. Reported events are duplicated to a minimal extent and should not adversely impact the analytical value of this data.

MATERNAL DELIVERY: Pertains to hospitals or birthing centers providing delivery service in 1995 and to neonatal facilities as of May, 1995. Data is provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Division of Women's Health.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES: Information is provided for calendar year 1995 and was obtained from the ADPH, Bureau of Disease Control, Divisions of HIV/AIDS, Sexually Transmitted Disease Control, Tuberculosis Control, and Epidemiology.

ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: 1994 water system data are provided by the Alabama Rural Water Association. Permitted landfill information is for 1995 and is provided by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management, Land

Division, Solid Waste Branch. Unauthorized landfill data for FY 1995 are provided by ADPH, Bureau of Environmental Services, Community Environmental Protection Division. Superfund sites are sites on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency National Priorities List for 1995. Data are provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

LABOR FORCE PARTICIPATION: Information (1995 annual average) excludes members of the U.S. military and is provided by the Alabama Department of Industrial Relations, Research and Statistics Division. Employment by industry is by county of work and includes only those industries subject to the provisions of Alabama's Unemployment Compensation Law. Civilian labor force estimates are by county of residence.

ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PARTICIPATION: Medicaid eligible information for FY 1995 is provided by the Alabama Medicaid Agency. Counties will not total to the state due to residents moving across county lines during the fiscal year. Medicaid recipient data for FY 1995 for the state is provided by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA). Medicaid recipient data for the counties is not available. Medicare information as of July 1, 1995, is provided by HCFA. Aid For Dependent Children information for October, 1994 to September, 1995 is provided by the Alabama Department of Human Resources. Women, Infants and Children information reflects the average caseload for FY 1995 as provided by the ADPH, Bureau of Family Health Services, Women, Infants and Children Division.

CRIME: Information is from 1995 Crime in Alabama published by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and reflects data as reported by local criminal justice agencies in Alabama for calendar year 1995.

POPULATION: 1995, 2000 and 2005 population projections and 1990 poverty level information are provided by the Alabama State Data Center, Center for Business and Economic Research, University of Alabama. Per Capita Income for 1994 is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

TECHNICAL NOTES

NOTATIONS INVOLVING VITAL EVENTS DATA

Notices given in this section pertain to vital events data presented in the county profiles. This includes the entire contents of the first profile page and the Leading Causes of Death, Accidental Death, Cancer Death by Site, and Marriage/Divorce sections on the second page.

COMPLETENESS OF DATA

At the present time birth registration in Alabama is believed to be close to 100 percent complete. The completeness of birth registration was last tested in 1950, at which time it was found to be 95.9 percent complete. For births occurring in hospitals, registration completeness was found to be 99.6 percent. The Center for Health Statistics receives a monthly listing of births occurring at all Alabama hospitals which is used in verifying birth registration. In addition, other activities such as the linkage of birth and death certificates for infant mortality analysis help assure that births more likely to go unrecorded are registered.

Death registration in Alabama is also believed to be close to 100 percent complete. While no completeness of death registration test has been conducted, several activities are conducted by the Center for Health Statistics to assure that events more likely to go unrecorded do get registered. Monthly listings of all deaths occurring in Alabama's hospitals, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and hospices are received to verify death registration. In addition, a monthly surveillance of all infants born with extremely high risk factors is conducted to assure accuracy of reporting and death registration completeness.

Registration of fetal deaths is required by Alabama law only when the gestation period was 20 weeks or more. Since not all fetal deaths are medically attended, some may not be recognized as fetal deaths. Consequently, there may be some under registration of these deaths. Evidence tends to indicate that fetal death reporting may be more complete in metropolitan counties.

The first abortion reporting required in Alabama was authorized by the Parental Consent Act and applied only to women under age 18. This reporting was initiated in September 1987. It was not until January 1, 1993 that the reporting of all abortions was required by Alabama law. No test of reporting completeness has been conducted. However, a comparison of institutions reporting was made in 1988 with the Division of Reproductive Health in the Centers for Disease Control which also collects abortion data.

Institutions which were not aware of reporting requirements were contacted and reporting was initiated at that time.

Not all abortions occurring in other states involving Alabama residents are being reported to the Center for Health Statistics, with Florida being the main concern. Florida does not have a procedure for reporting Alabama resident abortions to the Center for Health Statistics.

Marriage is thought to be well reported. Annual comparisons of totals for licenses issued by each county are used to identify counties where significant changes in the number of licenses issued have occurred. Probate offices in these counties are contacted to verify such changes or identify possible reporting problems. Divorce registration is believed to be not as complete as the registration of marriages because many divorces which are initiated are never finalized. Annual comparisons of totals for finalized divorces by county are made to identify those counties with significant changes. Contacts are made with circuit clerks in these counties to verify totals or identify possible reporting problems.

It is recognized that some vital events certificates or reports were filed after the final tabulations; however, the number is insignificant.

A cooperative agreement between states and territories of the United States and provinces and territories of Canada allows inclusion of out of state births, deaths, fetal deaths and abortions involving Alabama residents in Alabama resident totals. Annual comparisons are made to assure that this reporting is consistent. Marriages and divorces are not included in this agreement. Data on marriages and divorces involving Alabama residents which are registered outside of Alabama are not included in this publication.

QUALITY OF DATA

Every precaution is taken to minimize errors in the raw data during the process of completion and filing. Documents filed with the Center for Health Statistics are visually checked for completeness and returned if found to be incomplete or improperly completed.

Prior to coding, each document is edited for consistency and completeness. Selected data items are verified before computer entry. Following computer entry, data items are subjected to numerous validity and consistency edits with corrective actions being taken as required.

CAUSE OF DEATH

All causes of death are coded in accordance with the *International Classification of Diseases, Ninth Revision, (ICD)*. The ninth revision was first used for cause of death classification on January 1, 1979.

The cause of death coded is the "underlying cause" using established nosological rules and death certificate information. The "underlying cause" is defined as that cause deemed responsible for the sequence of morbid events leading directly to death.

Specific causes of death, which are included in the "Leading Causes of Death" section, are those listed in the "List of 72 Selected Causes" maintained by the National Center for Health Statistics and published in various mortality publications produced by that agency. It should be noted that Alzheimer's Disease was first included in this ranking starting with 1994 data.

Groupings by ICD code for accidental deaths by type of accident in the "Accidental Death" section and cancer deaths by site of cancer in the "Cancer Death by Site" section are presented below. Caution should be exercised in comparing this data to similar subject data since the classification of deaths by type of accident and cancer deaths by site tend to vary between statistical publications in the classification of specific accident types and sites of cancer. In addition, the specific ICD codes used for these classifications may vary between publications.

CLASSIFICATION OF DATA BY PLACE

Vital events data presented in this publication, excluding marriage and divorce, are classified by "county of residence." Data classified according to "place of residence" are statistically counted according to the usual residence of the mother in the case of a birth, fetal death, or abortion, and the usual residence of the decedent in the case of death, without regard to the geographic location where the event occurred.

Marriage data is presented by the county where the marriage occurred and divorce is presented by the county where the divorce was legally finalized.

RACE

Certificates which include race classifications are generally coded using nine racial categories. However, for reporting purposes, two categories are utilized. White includes Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cajun, Creole and other Caucasian. The "black and other" racial group includes Black, American Indian, Chinese, Japanese, Hawaiian, Filipino, other Asian or Pacific Islander, or mixtures of white and other races.

According to the 1990 Census of Population for Alabama, the "black and other" racial group as presented in this publication can be assumed to consist of 95.9 percent Black, 1.5 percent

American Indian, 0.4 percent Asian Indian, 0.3 percent Korean, 0.4 percent Chinese, 0.2 percent Japanese, 0.2 percent Vietnamese, 0.2 percent Filipino, and 0.9 percent all other non-white races.

HANDLING OF UNKNOWNNS

Items which are reported as "unknown" or for which no response was provided are not statistically distributed into the frequency distribution. Rather, these items are shown as "unknown" in this publication.

The only exception to this rule is for race and sex. There are very few instances in which a race cannot be determined. However, when this does occur the race is considered "white" for reporting purposes. If sex cannot be determined, the sex is considered male if the day of birth is odd and female if the day of birth is even.

STATISTICAL RATE LIMITATIONS

All statistics are subject to chance variation. Such random variation in a large universe of data has little effect on the quality or usefulness of the data. However, random variation occurring when the number of events is limited or when the population on which the rate is predicated is small may produce rates which are correct but of limited value for application purposes.

In this report rates are given even when there were few occurrences of a particular vital event. Warnings are issued in table footnotes when rates may be unstable.

A second limitation involves rates calculated using small population bases. In this report such rates are published, but are denoted by an "*" and population base limitations are noted in the table footnotes.

Rates which are subject to these limitations are accurate, but would not be stable for use in certain statistical procedures, especially time analysis.

DEFINITIONS

ABORTION — In this publication, the terms *abortion* and *induced termination of pregnancy* are used synonymously.

CAUSE OF DEATH — The cause of death presented in this publication is the "underlying cause" which is defined as the cause deemed responsible for the sequence of morbid events leading directly to death. Deaths, by cause, are classified according

to the *International Classification of Diseases, Ninth Revision*, following instructions established by the National Center for Health Statistics.

DEATH — Death is generally defined as no spontaneous respiratory or cardiac function and no expectation of recovery of these functions. For definitions of death determination under other than general circumstances the Code of Alabama should be consulted.

DISSOLUTION — In this publication, the terms *dissolution* and *divorce* are used synonymously.

DIVORCE — A court decree dissolving a marital relationship. A divorce from bed and board is a separation from cohabitation which does not otherwise affect the marriage and is not included in this publication. For rate calculation purposes divorces include annulments and are reported by the county where legal finalization occurred. In this publication, the terms *divorce* and *dissolution* are used synonymously.

ESTIMATED TOTAL FETAL LOSSES — This term, which is a component used in determining the number of pregnancies presented in the "Pregnancy Statistics" sub-section, is used in describing the estimated number of fetal deaths, regardless of gestational age. "Estimated total fetal losses" is considered to be equal to the sum of 20 percent of live births and 10 percent of abortions. This formula was developed by The Alan Guttmacher Institute and is widely accepted and used. "Estimated total fetal losses" should be distinguished from the term "fetal deaths" which describes events of at least 20 weeks in gestation which are reported as required by Alabama law (see Alabama's legal definition of fetal death below).

ESTIMATED POPULATION — Estimated population as of April 1 of the year for which the estimate is made.

ESTIMATED PREGNANCIES — The sum of births, abortions, and estimated total fetal losses.

FETAL DEATH — Death prior to the complete expulsion or extraction from the mother of a product of human conception, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy and which is not an induced termination of pregnancy. The death is indicated by the fact that after the expulsion or extraction the fetus does not breathe or show any other evidence of life, such as beating of the heart, pulsation of the umbilical cord, or definite movement of voluntary muscles. Heartbeats are to be distinguished from transient cardiac contractions; respirations are to be distinguished from fleeting respiratory efforts or gasps.

Fetal deaths are required to be reported under Alabama law only if the fetus has advanced to or beyond, the twentieth week of uterogestation.

INDUCED TERMINATION OF PREGNANCY — The purposeful interruption of an intrauterine pregnancy

with the intention other than to produce a liveborn infant and which does not result in a live birth. This definition excludes management of prolonged retention of products of conception following fetal death. In this publication, the terms *induced termination of pregnancy* and *abortion* are used synonymously.

INFANT DEATH — Death of a liveborn infant under one year of age.

LIVE BIRTH — The complete expulsion or extraction from the mother of a product of human conception, irrespective of the duration of the pregnancy, which, after such expulsion or extraction, breathes, or shows any other evidence of life such as beating of the heart, pulsation of the umbilical cord, or definite movement of voluntary muscles, whether or not the umbilical cord has been cut or the placenta is attached. Heartbeats are to be distinguished from transient cardiac contractions; respirations are to be distinguished from fleeting respiratory efforts or gasps.

In this publication, the terms "live birth" and "birth" are used synonymously.

LOW BIRTH WEIGHT — A weight at birth of under 2,500 grams or 5 pounds and 8 ounces.

MARRIAGE — The legal union of individuals. Marriage data are reported by the county where the marriage occurred.

MATERNAL DEATH — A death due to complications of pregnancy, labor, delivery, or puerperium (ICD codes 630-676).

NEONATAL DEATH — Death of a liveborn infant occurring within the first 27 days of life.

PERINATAL DEATH — Death of a fetus of 28 or more weeks gestation or death of a liveborn infant under seven days of life. It should be noted that there are several definitions for perinatal death. Caution should be exercised to assure that the same definition is being used in analysis.

PREGNANCY — The condition of having a developing embryo or fetus in the body, after union of an ovum and spermatozoon.

POSTNEONATAL DEATH — Death of a liveborn infant after the first 27 days of life, but before one year of age.

TEENAGE — In this publication, references to teenagers include those persons aged 10 years through 19 years.

NOTATIONS INVOLVING DATA OTHER THAN VITAL EVENTS

Vital events data are presented for calendar year 1995. Whenever possible, data covering this same time period were obtained from other sources. Variances from this time period are either noted in the actual table or in the "NOTES" on the third profile page. It should be noted that county totals for selected data items will not sum to the state total. Data reported for the state total may not always be clearly identified by county for various reasons. **It is strongly recommended that users contact the named sources of other data regarding specific questions or limitations which are not referenced in the "NOTES."**

It should also be noted that all vital events data presented in these profiles are for residents of the county except for marriage and divorce data. Marriages are presented by the county where the marriage occurred. Divorces are presented by the county where the divorce was legally finalized. Not all data from other sources are available by the county of residence. Where possible, data other than vital events are presented for the county of residence. Any exceptions are indicated in the "NOTES" on the third profile page.

ADDRESSES OF DATA SOURCES

TIPS ON USING DATA

This publication presents a recording of selected statistics which have historically been in demand by analysts and planners working in health professions or with health-related studies. Data presented in this publication can be used in the analysis of various subjects and to identify possible sources of additional or more detailed data. While many users of statistics have a good working knowledge of data analysis and presentation, others may not fully understand this application and possible data limitations. This section discusses special concerns which should be considered in working with statistics.

INFORMATION IS AVAILABLE BY RESIDENCE OR OCCURRENCE

Information can pertain to the place where the event occurred or the residence of subjects involved. All vital events data contained in this publication are by residence except for marriage and divorce which are by the county of occurrence. Data from other sources is not always available by the county of residence. Known exceptions are indicated in the "NOTES" on the third profile page.

Persons analyzing or presenting data should carefully evaluate their subject prior to initiating data collection or analysis to determine whether data by residence or occurrence is needed for their specific project. Data sources should be contacted during the planning stage to assure that information is obtainable as desired. Caution should be exercised in determining whether to use data by residence or occurrence since large differences can result from this decision.

USING RATES/RATIOS/PERCENTAGES OR SIMPLE TOTALS

Data can be reported as totals, rates, ratios, percentages, etc. Simple totals will suffice when the user needs to know how many times a certain event occurred and no relationship or comparison is to be made with other areas or different time periods.

When different areas or time periods are being studied it may be best to use rates, ratios, percentages, etc. Populations vary between areas or over time in the same area. Variations could result from changes in the population and may not indicate a new trend.

Rates, ratios, percentages, etc. express the occurrence of events in relation to a set standard. For example, the crude birth rate is expressed per 1,000 total population. This comparison removes differences between sizes of areas being compared or changes in population over time and allows for analysis of changes in event patterns.

DATA REPORTING LIMITATIONS

Unfortunately, many studies which utilize data are limited by the fact that all events or variables which are needed may not be reported. Legal requirements and difficulty of collection tend to restrict the availability of many data items.

Teenage pregnancy is one such subject. Pregnancies can result in live births, abortions, or fetal losses. Live births are legally required to be reported and abortions are required to be reported starting on January 1, 1993; however, fetal deaths only with an estimated gestation of 20 or more weeks are required to be reported. A formula is used to estimate the number of "fetal losses" which is the term used in this publication for fetal deaths of all gestational ages.

Variations in actual reporting between geographical areas rather than legal reporting requirements can produce deceiving conclusions. The reporting of fetal deaths is an example of this potential variation. While the legal reporting requirements are the same in all counties, it is known that actual reporting of fetal deaths is more complete in metropolitan counties. Possible reporting variation between geographical areas should be considered to avoid erroneous conclusions.

VARIATIONS IN DEFINITIONS

While vital events definitions are consistent within Alabama, there are some subjects such as fetal deaths and some methods of analysis such as the perinatal mortality rate which vary in definition between states or nations. There are also some subjects such as selected causes of death which may experience changes in definition over time.

In analyzing other data presented in this publication, the source of this data should be contacted concerning possible variations in definitions. This potential is greater for subjects which are not legally defined.

To assure consistency and avoid erroneous conclusions, a data user should always compare definitions when contrasting different geographical areas or time periods.

SMALL NUMBER LIMITATIONS

There are two limitations involving small numbers. One involves a small number of occurrences for a particular event and the other involves rates, ratios, percentages, etc. calculated for a relatively small population even though the number of occurrences of that event may not be considered small for the particular analysis that is being conducted. This publication contains small numbers and calculations based on small numbers as a published historical record. However, caution should be exercised concerning the use of such data in a study. The statistical stability of small numbers cannot be assured.

If a simple quote is needed with no analysis over time or comparison to other areas, small numbers should pose no threat to a study. However, if small numbers are being used for more than simple quote it may be necessary to calculate

a rate, ratio, percentage, etc. for a period of years to smooth out annual variations. Or it may be necessary to perform a more detailed statistical analysis to determine whether differences between rates are statistically significant.

Determination of what constitutes a small number must be made by the individual user in consideration of the study being conducted. However, numbers smaller than 16 are generally considered unstable for use in most statistical computations.

INFLUENCES ON DATA

Every study involving statistics should be analyzed for possible influences that are independent of the variables included in the study. For example, a study of the relationship between marital status and birth weight would show that unwed mothers tend to have smaller babies. However, the age of the mother may have more to do with this weight differential than marital status since younger women tend to have smaller babies and are more likely to be unmarried than are older women.
